

Clinical Practice Procedures: Other/Donning and doffing of medical gloves

Purpose	To ensure a consistent procedural approach to the donning and doffing of medical gloves.
Scope	Applies to Queensland Ambulance Service (QAS) clinical staff.
Health care setting	Pre-hospital assessment and treatment.
Population	Applies to all ages unless stated otherwise.
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Donning and doffing of medical gloves

Medical gloves assist in protecting both clinicians and patients from exposure to infectious pathogens. Medical gloves must be worn during all patient care activity that has an actual or potential risk of exposing the clinician to blood, body substances, secretions, excretions or contaminated environments.

Medical gloves used by QAS can be classified into 2 broad categories:

- Non-sterile examination gloves; and
- Sterile surgical gloves.

The use of gloves when not clinically indicated is unnecessary and does not contribute to a reduction of cross-transmission.

Indications [1]

Non-sterile gloves:

 An identified actual or potential exposure to blood, body substances, secretions, excretions or contaminated environments NOT requiring aseptic technique.

Sterile gloves (aseptic requirement):

- Surgical procedures
 - (e.g. thoracotomy, thoracostomy,
 - wound closure (suturing/skin adhesive))
 - Vaginal birth
- Bimanual compression

When no actual or potential exposure to blood, body substances, secretions, excretions or contaminated environments is identified.

- Glove contamination
- Patient cross contamination
- Allergic reaction to glove

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DONNING NON-STERILISED GLOVES

- 1. Remove the glove from the original box.
- 2. Touch only a restricted surface of the glove corresponding to the wrist (at the top edge of the cuff).

3. Don the

first glove.

Take the second glove with the bare hand and touch only a restricted surface of glove corresponding to the wrist.

4.

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5. To avoid touching the skin of the forearm with the gloved hand, turn the external surface of the glove to be donned on the folded fingers of the gloved hand, thus permitting to glove the second hand.

6. Once gloved, hands should not touch any surface that is not defined by indications and conditions of the gloves use.

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DOFFING NON-STERILISED GLOVES

 Pinch one glove at the wrist level and gently peel off the hand allowing the glove to turn inside out. 2. Hold the removed glove in the gloved hand and slide the fingers of the ungloved hand inside between the glove and the wrist. Remove the second glove by rolling it down the hand and folding it in the first glove.

3. Appropriately discard the removed gloves.

Second glove is folded over the first glove

First glove –

4. Perform hand hygiene with Cutan[®] Alcohol Foam in accordance with manufacturer's instructions.


 Perform hand hygiene with Cutan[®] Alcohol Foam in accordance with manufacturer's instructions.

> Examine the sterile glove packaging for integrity.
> Open the outer packet to expose the inner sterile package.

 Place the second sterile package on a clean, dry surface without touching the surface. Open and unfold the package so the glove cuffs are nearest to the clinician.

4. Using the thumb and index finger of one hand, carefully grasp
the folded cuff edge of the glove. Ø

inside out.

 Remove the other glove by turning its outer edge on the fingers of the partially ungloved hand. 3. Remove the glove by turning inside out entirely to ensure that the skin of the clinician is always and exclusively in contact with the inner surface of the glove.

Appropriately discard

the removed gloves.

Additional information

- Appropriate hand hygiene is the single most effective intervention to reduce Healthcare Associated Infections^[1]
- Hand hygiene products (e.g. alcohol based hand rubs) should not be applied to gloves.
- Under no circumstances are the same pair of gloves to be worn for the care of more than one patient.
- If the integrity of a glove is compromised (e.g. punctured), it should be changed as soon as possible and complemented with hand hygiene.

5. Perform hand hygiene with Cutan® Alcohol Foam in accordance with manufacturer's instructions.
